SUBJECT: Academic Year (AY) 2024-2025 RDEDB Convening Notice and Invitation to Apply

ARPC SUSPENSE: 26 Sep 2023

- 1. The AY24/25 Air Force Reserve Developmental Education Designation Board (RDEDB) will convene 23-27 Oct 2023 at Headquarters Air Reserve Personnel Center, Buckley SFB, Colorado. In order to be considered by this board, it is imperative that all applicants and endorsers read and comply with the instructions outlined in Attachment 1. ARPC suspense/deadline is 26 Sep 2023. Late applications will not be accepted.
- 2. The RDEDB is convened to identify the best-qualified officers for in-residence developmental course placement. Board members will evaluate applicants based on the whole person concept, which includes depth and breadth of military experience. In addition, applicants will be evaluated on responsibilities that capitalize on the member's attendance at a specified course as well as their demonstrated professional and leadership qualities. The RDEDB process complements the Air Force Reserve Force Development construct by aligning the best qualified applicants with selected courses. All school board selections will be based on the needs of the Air Force Reserve followed by consideration for the individual's school preferences.
- 3. Please ensure this message is given the widest possible dissemination. All officers, raters, and additional raters should familiarize themselves with the process for submitting applications for courses.

Attachment 1: AY24/25 RDEDB Application Information

1. **Application Process.** Applicants must submit a nomination package through MyVector https://myvector.us.af.mil by the application deadline (26 Sep 2023). Eligible applicants will receive a MyVector notification and can apply via the link in the notification. A MyVector 'How to' guide and FAQs are located on the Air Reserve Personnel Center's Force Development page. **Incomplete and late applications will not be accepted.**

1.1. Eligibility

- **1.1.1. Fitness.** Each applicant must have a current and passing fitness assessment upon submission of their application. You can obtain your "Fitness Tracker Report" from myFSS: https://myfss.us.af.mil under the myFitness application. The "Fitness Tracker Report" must be attached to the application in PDF format. If you are unable to access your fitness report, contact your unit's Fitness Monitor.
- **1.1.2. Participation Summary.** Applicants must have satisfactory participation for the last 5 years. Satisfactory participation is defined as a minimum of 50 points per year. Applicants with less than 5 years' time-in-service are exempt from this requirement but must meet the 50 points for every year they served as an officer. Applicants not meeting this requirement must submit a waiver.
- **1.1.3. Mandatory Separation Date (MSD).** The Mandatory Separation Date is the calendar date on which a service member must either be discharged or retired from military service based on mandatory service time, grade, and age criteria. The MSD requirement for each course can be found within Attachment 2, Course Descriptions.
- **1.1.4. Total Federal Commissioned Service Date (TFCSD).** TFCSD includes all periods of federally recognized commissioned service, whether active or inactive duty. This is identified as the original date of commissioning. The TFCSD requirement for each course can be found within Attachment 2, Course Descriptions.
- **1.1.5. Service Commitment.** All members who attend IDE, SDE, or ASG courses in-residence will incur a 3-year reserve service commitment upon completion. If selected, members will have to sign a reserve service commitment memorandum.
- **1.1.6.** Time on Station (TOS). AGR applicants must have 2 years TOS prior to course start date.
- **1.1.7. Prior In-Residence School Selects.** Applicants who were selected and attended IDE/SDE in-residence are not eligible for subsequent courses *within the same category* (does not apply to SAASS).
- **1.2.** Disqualifying Factors. Applicants are not eligible to apply if they have any of the following indicators:
 - **1.2.1.** Current Unfavorable Information File (UIF).
 - **1.2.2.** No Passing Fitness Assessment.

- **1.2.3.** Not meeting the prerequisites/eligibility requirements for a course.
- **1.2.4.** Incomplete/improperly coordinated application.
- **1.2.5.** Twice deferred for promotion as defined by Title 10 U.S.C., Section 14501.
- **1.2.6.** Participating Individual Ready Reserve (PIRR) members cannot apply.
- **1.3.** Course Selection. Applicants may select multiple courses. Courses should be prioritized by specifying the course preference and attendance date. Course selection should be based on relevance to career path and professional goals.
- **1.4. Application Comments.** Comments from the applicant and each endorser are mandatory. Comments must be clear, concise, and in bullet format (limit 1500 characters).
 - **1.4.1. Applicant.** Justification should include their desire to attend specific course(s) and address potential for academic success, potential as a Reserve ambassador, future leadership potential, and assessment of Air Force Reserve's (AFR) Return on Investment from course attendance.
 - 1.4.2. Rater and Wg/CC (or equivalent). Comments should assess the member's potential for academic success, potential as a Reserve ambassador, future leadership potential, and assessment of AFR's Return on Investment. It is recommended that raters provide stratification for specified schools from within the unit's applicant pool (example "My #1/5 Lt Col's nominated to attend a RDEDB opportunity"). Endorsers should thoroughly vet applicants and evaluate course selection(s) to ensure members are applying for courses appropriate for their Core ID, rank, career path and developmental timeline.
- **1.5. Application Withdrawal Procedures.** Once an application is submitted to ARPC, applicants wishing to withdraw their application must contact ARPC/DPAF by emailing arpc.dpaf.rdedb@us.af.mil.
- **1.6. Dual Board Consideration.** If a member has applied for school tour consideration through both the Reserve Developmental Education Designation Board (RDEDB) and the Reserve School Selection Board (RSSB), and is deemed a RDEDB select, the RDEDB selection quota will take precedence and the member's RSSB application will be removed from consideration. If a member is currently enrolled in an IDE or SDE school tour, they can apply for RSSB courses that occur after their graduation date.
- **1.7. Waivers.** Waivers must be submitted along with the application for any eligibility requirements not met. A waiver template is available within the MyVector application or by contacting ARPC/DPAF by emailing arpc.dpaf.rdedb@us.af.mil
- 2. **Board Process.** Along with the MyVector application, the board will review each applicant's Officer Performance Reports (OPRs), Reserve-Officer Development Plan (R-ODP), Development Team (DT) Vectors, Decorations, Academic Education, and Assignment History.
 - **2.1. Records Update.** Applicants must ensure their records are current prior to the application deadline. Members can verify their records in PRDA and/or vMPF. For assistance with record updates contact your local CSS/MPF.
- 3. **Funding.** All DE in-residence courses boarded through the RDEDB are centrally funded by HQ AFRC. TRs, IMAs, AGRs, and ARTs (attending in military status) course and travel are centrally funded with authorized PCS entitlements. ARTs wishing to attend in civilian status must apply through the appropriate Civilian Developmental Education process.

- 4. **Billets While Attending School.** DE in-residence attendance is considered a PCS for all reserve members and will be provided PCS orders to school. However, not all members will be removed from the billet they occupied prior to school.
 - **4.1. School Billets (TR, ART, IMA).** TR, ART, and IMA students will continue to occupy the billet they occupied prior to PCSing, (*Note: AOC is an exception; please see the AOC Course Description for specifics*).
 - **4.2. School Billets (AGRs).** AGRs will vacate the billet they occupied prior to attending school and will be assigned to a student billet under AF/RE. School orders will reflect a permanent change of assignment from current unit/organization to AF/RE, with duty at the school attending. Additionally, duty title and DAFSC should reflect as student status (92SO). (Note: AOC is an exception; please see the AOC Course Description for specifics).
- 5. **Student Out-placement.** All applicants should understand the in-resident assignment facilitation process prior to submitting an application for a course.
 - 5.1. Student Assignment Facilitation Process. ARPC Force Development Division, Career Field Managers (CFMs), and AFR senior leaders facilitate post-graduation follow-on assignments based on the needs of the AFR, and students' assignment desires. Students are required to seek, and apply to follow-on assignments, and to clearly communicate their placement desires to their CFM and assignment facilitator throughout the academic year. Please refer to Course Descriptions for specific Program follow-on requirements.
 - **5.2. Student Assignment Facilitation Panel.** Co-chaired by AF/RE-D and AFRC/CD and comprised of panel members including NAF/CCs, CFMs, AF/REG, ARPC/CC, and Senior Leaders. All students who were in AGR status prior to school *are required* to accept a follow-on assignment and *cannot return* to their previous position. All others (TR, IMA, ART) will either accept a new position post-graduation or will return to their previous position upon approval from the panel.
- 6. **Points of Contact.** Members should direct questions concerning RDEDB applications to their respective chain of command before contacting ARPC. If further clarification is required, members should contact ARPC/DPAF by emailing arpc.dpaf.rdedb@us.af.mil.

Additional Information:

- 1. If the Rater is also the Senior Rater (Wg/CC or Equivalent), the 2nd Level of routing does not apply.
- 2. Members assigned to Joint or Combatant Command billets who have raters/senior raters in sister services may choose to have their applications routed through the corresponding AF Element (IMAs may choose to coordinate their application through their respective RIO Det).
- **3.** Wg/CCs will serve as 2nd Endorser for all applicants at SQ/GP/WG Level who are in the grade of O-4/O-5 selects, unless the unit is a direct report to the NAF, in which case the final Endorser will be the first O-6 in the applicant's rating chain.
- **4.** NAF/CC coordination is required on applications for members who are assigned to a NAF staff position and on all O-5 and above applicants, who are assigned to a SQ/GP/WG Level.

- Member and rater must acknowledge member may remain out of career field for up to 4.5 years (18 mo program + 3 years ADSC).
- Application for this course *must* include an Air Force formatted biography; inclusion of not more than 3 letters of recommendation is optional.
- If selected as a candidate, you will be required to have a face-to-face board in Washington DC before final course selection.

6. AOC Program Specifics:

- JPME I credit IS NOT awarded upon completion of AOC. Students MUST complete ACSC-DL as a pre-requisite to receive JPME I credit.
- Select will be assessed onto a 3-year AGR tour prior to beginning the master's program at UCCS.
- Member cannot promote to O-5 while assigned to this position nor curtail orders for promotion purposes.
- Application for this course *must* include an Air Force formatted biography; inclusion of not more than 3 letters of recommendation is optional.

7. ASAM Program Specifics:

- JPME I credit IS NOT awarded upon completion of ASAM. Students MUST complete ACSC-DL to receive JPME Phase I credit.
- SECRET security clearance REQUIRED for attendance & MUST be obtained prior to class start date.
- Applicants MUST have the following:
 - o Baccalaureate degree, preferably in business administration, transportation, logistics, economics, mathematics, or engineering with a cumulative undergraduate GPA of 3.0 or higher on 4.0 scale.
 - o A grade of B or higher in college algebra.
 - o A minimum GRE score of 153 Verbal/148 Quantitative or a GMAT score of 550 or higher.
